

Parole Determination

Parole Granted

The NSW State Parole Authority today made a parole order for offender Kaycee Henzon who will remain supervised and subject to strict conditions during her reintegration.

The offender was convicted of the murder of a woman at Epping on 19 November 2009 through reckless indifference to human life without an intention to kill, and two counts of obtaining money by deception.

She was sentenced to 18 years for murder, expiring 9 June 2029 with a non-parole period of 13 years, expiring 9 June 2024.

At a public review hearing today, the Authority confirmed it had received the expert advice of the Serious Offenders Review Council which noted Henzon had completed her intervention program pathway; numerous educational and vocational programs; and had participated in external leave, including works, day and weekend release to assist with her transition.

“We are satisfied that her release to parole is sufficient for her re-integration and the protection of the public,” the SORC advised.

Community Corrections also supported parole, reporting she is assessed as a low risk of reoffending and will continue participating in appropriate interventions in the community.

The State advised the Authority it did not oppose her release to supervised parole.

On the material before it, the Authority determined parole was in the interest of community safety and ordered Henzon be released to supervised parole not earlier than 13 June 2024 and not later than 20 June 2024.

On parole she will be continue serving her sentence subject to compliance with:

- Standard Conditions of parole 1-11
- Additional Conditions that she must:
 - Not engage in any activity, paid or unpaid, involving the control of money or assets of other people or organisations.
 - Not contact, communicate with, watch, stalk, harass or intimidate the victims and victims’ family.
 - Not frequent or visit the Local Government Area of Dubbo, the township of Deniliquin and the suburb of Belmore.

Her parole order expires 9 June 2029, unless revoked.
