Parole Determination Terence Borg

Parole Granted

The NSW State Parole Authority has granted parole to offender Terence Borg after it was advised his release on parole was not opposed by any party, including the victim's family and the State.

Borg was convicted of the murder of his business partner, Susan Wirth, at a factory premises in Tuggerah, on the NSW Central Coast in 2008

He was sentenced to 21 years, commencing 12 July 2008, and expiring 11 July 2029.

His non parole period of 16 years expires 11 July 2024.

The State Parole Authority was advised the Serious Offenders Review Council and Community Corrections supported his release to supervised parole as appropriate for the protection of the community and his reintegration.

The Authority was advised Borg's conduct in custody was "without blemish"; that he had reflected on his offending having completed his therapeutic program pathway in custody; had participated in external work, day, and weekend leave for the past year without incident and has been assessed as a low risk of re-offending.

A victim's submission made by the Wirth family and described by the Authority as "generous and merciful" did not oppose his release on parole, revealing "having experienced God's Grace ourselves ...that we will make every effort to prevent harbouring hate and bitterness towards you."

Having considered all the material before it, the Authority determined supervised parole was in the interest of community safety.

It directed Borg be released not earlier than 11 July 2024 and not later than 18 July 2024.

He must comply with Standard Conditions 1-11 and Additional Conditions that he MUST:

- Abstain from alcohol.
- Not contact, communicate with, watch, stalk, harass or intimidate the victim's family.

His parole order expires 11 July 2029, unless it is revoked.
